250 years ago...

October 1775 was a pivotal month in the early stages of the American Revolution. The Continental Congress continued to meet in Philadelphia throughout October 1775. Discussions included organizing the Continental Army, securing supplies, and debating the colonies' next steps. Although independence was not yet officially declared, the Congress's actions increasingly asserted American autonomy and resistance to British authority. This demonstrated the growing resolve and organizational capacity of the American colonies as they moved from protest to open conflict and nation-building.

Of note:

- October 8th, Continental Army Officers decide to bar slaves and free blacks from serving in the Continental Army.
- On October 13th, The United States Continental Congress orders the establishment of the Continental Navy (later renamed the United States Navy). Colonial privateers and newly-commissioned Continental Navy ships began to harass British supply lines along the American coast.
- Ongoing, the Siege of Fort St. Jean (Canada) by American forces and Benedict Arnold's grueling expedition continues their march toward Quebec.
- On October 26th, King Geroge III goes before Parliament to declare the American colonies in rebellion, and authorized a military response to quell the American Revolution.
- October 28th, a British proclamation forbids residents from leaving Boston.

Did someone say "apple cider"...

As the York County apple growing season ends, the ritual of picking the crop and producing some of the finest apple products in the United States begins, including such local favorites as apple butter, apple sauce and, of course, apple cider.

The Gayman Heritage Orchard at Dills Tavern is no different, as the 5 varietals, having avoided the early season frosts, produced another banner crop this year. Some might also say that our Wassail celebration in January protected our crop!



Over the course of the season local farmers Lem Cristophel, owner of Eden Farms, and Herb Bomberger have lovingly cared for the trees with regular preventive spraying, trimming and culling. Christophel and his son, Brian, recently spent a beautiful morning picking the apples, totaling approximately 16 Bushels. These apples will be kept in cold storage until they are pressed for cider at the Eden farm facility or at the public pressing to be held on **Ag Day**, **October 18** in the Tavern courtyard.

Visitors may be able to taste the wonderful blend of the apple flavors in bottled cider available at the Ag Day demonstrations held in conjunction with Farmers Fair. But, get there early, as supplies are limited!

The Impractical Distillers: Vol 1.8

The Dill Family and Distilling in Monaghan Township

Historical records related to distilling at Dills Tavern and the Eichelberger Distillery property center around the Eichelberger family, whose ledgers dating from 1800 to 1833 are filled with details about their distillery operations. However, documentation regarding distilling is not limited to the Eichelberger era. In fact, evidence of distilling activity on the property can be traced back fifty years earlier to the original owner, Matthew Dill.

When Matthew Dill passed away, his will and accompanying inventory provided valuable insight into the property's distilling history. In 1750, it was customary to create an inventory of all possessions of the deceased, listing and appraising each item. This process helped settle debts by selling items if necessary, and documenting any outstanding amounts owed to the deceased's estate.

Matthew Dill's inventory specifically mentions a still among his possessions: "To a stell (still) and vessels belonging to her -25 pounds."

He also owned a still house, which was referenced in the inventory: "To one bed on the loft and one in the stell (still) house"

Additionally, the inventory listed substantial quantities of grain: "To the grain in the barn the whote (wheat) and barley" — 30 pounds "To thirty bushels of Indian corn" — 2 pounds "To twenty five acres in the ground of winter grain" — 15 pounds "To two pounds of hops" — 2 shillings

The still was the most valuable single item listed in the inventory, valued at 30 pounds—more than Dill's best horse, complete with saddle and bridle, which was appraised at 22 pounds. 30 pounds from 1750 would be approximately \$8,490, a considerable sum for the frontier setting of Monaghan Township.

Grain was the second most valuable asset in the inventory. The "25 acres in the ground of winter grain" (likely winter wheat or rye) indicated substantial agricultural activity. A typical farmer in 1750 could expect a yield of 13 to 17 bushels of grain per acre which translates to 8 to $10 \frac{1}{2}$ tons of planted grain to be harvested.


The Impractical Distillers cont.

Grain was produced and harvested by hand, underscoring the labor-intensive nature of their operation. In addition to the grain still in the field, the inventory notes they already had at least twice that amount stored in the barn, valued at 30 pounds.

What's New! Celebrating Our Barns

Did you know that NYCHAPS has 2 barns of distinction? Recently we became aware of a project initiative launched by the Pennsylvania State Historic Preservation Society.

This office is inviting Pennsylvanians to contribute to an ongoing effort to document and celebrate the barns that define our state's rural heritage. The information collected will be used to create a historic record of each barn's story and will be added to the PA Inventory of Historic Places. Greg Wonders, NYCHAPS Archivist, is currently working on the submission of our historic barns for the project.





On the left, this barn was built between 1795-1798 by Abraham Burkholder, a Swiss-German-Mennonite immigrant, on his working farm, about six miles out off Mountain Road. Over the course of 4 years starting in 2012, NYCHAPS purchased, dismantled, and moved it to its present location at Dills Tavern. This style of barn, "grundschierre", translates to "ground barn" due to its historical German construction.

On the right, Maple Shade Farm ("dwelling, barn and tenement") was built in 1857 by Michael B. Mumper, the grandson of the original Michael Mumper who settled in the area in the early 1800's. It is built in the traditional Sweitzer style with the characteristic overshoot, or forebay, of the second story which shields the front stable wall while providing extra space in the barn's upper story. Located at 35 Greenbrier Lane, it houses the NYCHAPS office, research archives/collections, and a banquet hall.
